From the Rabbi s Desk Rabbi Alan Cook



"Let all who are hungry come and eat."

This is the promise that we make each year at our Passover seder. As we speak of matzah being the "bread of affliction," we try to project ourselves into the shoes of our ancestors and imagine the experience of slavery and oppression. Yet we

are fortunate that few, if any, of us have experienced abject poverty, oppressive working conditions, or the fear of not knowing from where our next meal may come.

As we celebrate our festival of freedom, such an integral part of our understanding of what it means to be a Jew, we should be cognizant of the fact that there are those who still experience slave-like environments and extreme economic injustice. We may try to console ourselves by imagining that such conditions exist only in far-off, third world countries. But the fact is that the starving children invoked by countless Jewish mothers and grandmothers in an effort to encourage us to clean our plates are not half a world away in China or Africa. They exist right here in the United States, and they exist in C-U.

A report released in early March showed that 23.4% of children in Champaign County were living at or below the poverty level in 2011. That's a 43% increase from approximately five years earlier. Human trafficking statistics are equally alarming: there were more than 363 reported incidents within Illinois in 2013 (though many were centered in the Chicago area), and officials suspect that an exponentially higher number go unreported. This means that there are individuals right under our noses who are being forced into drug trafficking, the sex trade, or other illicit activities against their will.

In our former prayerbook, *Gates of Prayer*, one of the meditations on freedom prior to the singing of *Mi Chamocha* read, "God our Creator, teach us to love freedom as we love life. Make us understand that only when all are free can we be free. Let none be masters and none be slaves. Then shall we sing as our people did when they were freed from Pharaoh's grip."

Are these mere words to us? Or are we prepared to act in the spirit of our liturgy? Are we ready to take the steps needed for societal change, so that we can lift our fellow citizens out of the cycle of hunger and poverty and fear?

The exhortation to remember that we were slaves in Egypt is reiterated in the Bible more frequently than any other theme. This implies that it is not sufficient merely to keep it

in the back of our minds, or to speak of it during worship and on Passover. Rather, we must take it to heart, to ensure that the freedom we enjoyed in the earliest days of our people's national identity can be enjoyed by all.

Here's one small step that we can take to combat the effects of hunger and poverty in our community, to take the expression "let all who are hungry come and eat" beyond the level of a mere platitude: help us distribute our "comfort bags" and "mitzvah bags." These bags were created during Good Deeds Day in March by many of our Religious School students. "Mitzvah Bags" contain non-perishable snacks; "Comfort Bags" contain travel-sized toiletries. Please take a few of each (available in boxes by the main Temple entrance) and keep them in your car. When you encounter an individual seeking cash assistance, instead offer him or her one of these bags. It's a small way to brighten his or her day, to show you care, and to try to preserve his or her dignity.

Certainly, this effort alone will not break the cycle of poverty in our community. Policy shifts and social strategies over the long term will be needed to make a serious shift. But certainly this is a start. If you are able to support, through donations of time or resources, any of the wonderful institutions in town dedicated to relieving poverty and hunger (Habitat for Humanity, the TIMES center, Salt and Light, etc.), please know that your hours and/or dollars are greatly appreciated and will be put to good use.

May all who are hungry- for physical, spiritual, or emotional nourishment- have the opportunity to have their needs satiated, so that all may enjoy the peace, freedom, and dignity that they deserve.

From the Board

Few events are more joyous than the festival of Purim. This year, we came together to celebrate by eating lots of food, playing games at a carnival, reading the Megillah and enjoying the original Muppet-themed Purim shpiel written by Rabbi Alan. The shpiel was well received too many people thought that I was type-cast as one of the two grumpy old men. I am not that old, you know. The shpiel's concluding song was a Purim-themed version of Rainbow Connection, one of my favorite songs. The real song asks:

"Why are there so many songs about rainbows – what's on the other side? Rainbows are visions, but only illusions and rainbows have nothing to hide. So we've been told and some choose to believe it – I know they're wrong, wait and see. Someday we'll find it, the Rainbow Connection – the lovers, the dreamers and me." It's a children's song but it has deeper meaning, in my opinion, much like "Over the Rainbow" – another of my favorites (perhaps because I was born and raised in Kansas). Anyhow, Kermit doesn't want to believe that rainbows are just illusions but are real. He believes that they keep us gazing to the heavens, continuing to dream of things that appear to be out of reach. But are they? If we keep wishing, perhaps dreams can come true.

So what does the Rainbow Connection have to do with Sinai Temple? We as a congregation must dream of a better world: where people are treated equally, where everyone has a roof over their heads, and where people have enough food on their plates. Those dreams seem like illusions at times; issues too big to address or to accomplish. But our congregation should not be deterred from trying and should take steps, however small, toward realizing these dreams. Rabbi Alan has taken many such steps but let me mention just two. First, he started a program where our members pick up leftover food at Atlanta Bread Co. and transport it to the TIMES Center (sign up online!). Second, he established a committee of interfaith and civic group leaders to identify local needs that we can work on together - for youth, families, the environment, and homelessness. We cannot change the world in a day, but Rabbi Alan is helping us do what we can to make these dreams come true.

Coming in as president almost a year ago, I too had dreams for the temple. Some of them may take years to achieve and the most I can do is simply lay the groundwork (e.g. increasing our endowments for the future and making our sanctuary more accessible to all). But some of my dreams can and have been realized. I believe in being "O"pen - I encouraged members to show their interest in the board nominating process. I believe in "L"ong term planning and development - the board has revised financial and other policies thought out-of-the-box fundraising ideas (Temple cookbook). I believe in welcoming "D"iversity - we have reached out to lapsed members, the larger lewish community, etc.

Rabbi Alan and I have worked diligently this past year to dream of a better community and have taken steps, however small, to try to realize that dream. Only time will tell whether our dreams, like rainbows, are merely illusions or are real. Some of my goals are to be "O"pen, to think "L"ong term and to welcome "D"iversity. Maybe Rabbi Alan was right - I may just be a grumpy "OLD" man.

From Our Educator

April brings Pesach, Passover. This holiday is one of the few holidays where the main celebration, the Seder. focuses on the children. One objective of the Seder is to "Teach your children." The Hagaddah is arranged and organized so that it inspires children to ask questions, to invoke their curiosity, and allows the parents, grandparents, and community members to act as teachers and pass along the story of the Exodus from Egypt to the next generations.

The Seder begins as with many lewish events with Kiddush. But immediately following that is the washing of the hands. For some this may be routine, while for others this alone may be a For those where novelty. this may be routine, it is marked with the difference of the exclusion of a blessing. There are then events such as eating strange foods such as parsley, dipping foods into salted water, breaking matzahs and hiding pieces, and then telling of a story.

This story begins with the youngest of children encouraged to ask four questions. Children are not asked to sit idly by. They are not shushed at the table, not sent (at least not yet) to the children's room, but asked to stand proudly and recite to all in attendance these four

anomalies—these four things that make this night different from all other nights.

As children grow and their patience hopefully expands, they can stay and participate in much of the discussion and explanation as to why this night is different from all other nights. They can stay and discuss how this one night, the Exodus from Egypt continues to change We can wear our masks of blood and frogs, our masks of boils and hail, we can sing our songs to We remember Elijah. Miriam, the sister without whom Moses would never have been.

We send our children off on a scavenger hunt to search about for the Afikomen so we may finally call our night to an end. We conclude our meal, praise our God, and sing our praises and hopes to one day truly be a free people, however we may choose to define that.

As you sit around your Seder table, may this mark the beginning of a Jewish journey for you. May you find teaching Jewish ideals something which you wish to do more by joining the elite staff of Sinai Temple Religious School.
