From the Rabbi's Desk



We remember,
We remember, yes we do,
We remember all of you.

We've become accustomed to singing this brief song during our

family services as a way of getting into the appropriate mindset and mood prior to the Mourner's *Kaddish*. After the more boisterous melodies that permeate the rest of our liturgy, it's nice to slow things down for a more contemplative moment of memory.

We've had a lot to contemplate in the past few months as a congregation as we have mourned the passing of beloved members of our community as well as cherished friends and relatives. And our calendar prescribes additional moments of memory in April and May as we commemorate Yom HaShoah (recalling the tragic events of the Holocaust) and Yom HaZikaron (recalling those who gave their lives in service to the state of Israel).

In each of these moments, as we stand and lovingly recite *Kaddish* in tribute to those who are no longer a physical presence in our lives, we reflect on their names and their legacies. It is not that the *Kaddish* itself speaks of death; rather, the prayer celebrates life, and speaks of our duty to praise God at every available opportunity.

The *Kaddish* originated in the 8th century, if not earlier. It was not until the 13th century that it is mentioned as a prayer for mourners. It is written not in Hebrew, but in Aramaic, the vernacular language of Talmud-era Jews, in order to make it accessible to all. Even if one was not literate in Hebrew, which was a more scholarly tongue, one could at least understand this portion of the liturgy.

But in recent years, the recitation of *Kaddish* has engendered some controversy. Traditionally, one recites *Kaddish* in memory of a spouse, sibling, parent, or child. In many congregations, those who are mourning for one of these relatives are asked to stand during the *Kaddish* while the remainder of the congregation remains seated; this is similar

to our congregation's current minhag.

But there are those who advocate for a more inclusive approach. Some argue that in the wake of the *Shoah*, there are many Jews who have nobody to say Kaddish to honor their memories. Others say that singling out mourners during *Kaddish* centers attention on them that is sometimes unwelcome during the grieving period.

This question was the topic of debate in the pages of *Reform Judaism* magazine over the past several issues. Many of you receive this publication at home; if not, you can read it online at http://reformjudaismmag.org The discussion centered in part around the question of whether mourners appreciate being asked to stand individually for *Kaddish* or whether they find it isolating.

I found one congregation's practice intriguing: at congregation Shaareiy Zedek in East Lansing, Michigan, the rabbi invites each mourner to share the name of the person for whom they are reciting *Kaddish*, if they are comfortable doing so, and sharing a sentence or two about that individual. Congregants report that this helps personalize the recitation of the prayer, and that it is meaningful and moving to hear these brief biographical sketches.

I would propose that we experiment with this custom within our own congregation. Beginning with our May 2 service, as we introduce the *Kaddish*, I will continue to read the full list of the names of individuals whose memories are honored by our congregation. Then, as mourners are invited to rise, I'll ask them, if they desire, to share the name of the person for whom they are mourning, and a few words about him or her. I hope that this will serve to give added meaning to the *Kaddish*, and draw us closer to one another. I welcome any feedback you may have on this new practice.

May the Source of peace continue to send peace to all who mourn, and may God continue to bestow comfort upon all the bereaved.

There is nothing more important as a temple community than sharing good news with each other. The column is an opportunity for you to tell us about your simcha, things that have brought you happiness and joy. It could be many things including a birth, wedding, anniversary, a new job, a promotion, a book being published, a sport's award, getting a part in the school play, etc. The key is that you must tell us. We cannot put it in the bulletin unless we know about it! So contact the temple office (or me) by phone or email and tell us the good news!

Second, we will be allowing advertisements at the back of the bulletin for a trial period of 6 months. The URJ tells us that many temples use ads to bring in revenue - and some are quite successful, bringing in thousands of dollars per month. The board discussed the issue at length and decided to put our toes in the water. We developed a policy which includes that we start with small ads and that Sinai maintain discretion on what ads to permit. Having said that, the parameters are essentially these: anyone can buy a business card size ad for \$25 per month. It can be an actual business card that we replicate. It can be an announcement for a school or sport fundraiser. It can be words or pictures or a combination - whatever suits your needs. We are going to start slowly by soliciting ads from temple members - there are a lot of business owners and professionals out there! If things go well, we will expand to the outside business world. The board will review all of this after 6 months to determine whether to make changes such as increasing ad size options or whether to end the ads completely.

I want to remind all of you that the Sinai Temple annual meeting is Sunday, May 18, starting with an ice cream social at 7 PM, followed by the business meeting at 7:30 PM. I hope you can make it.


