Thanks to our publication deadlines, I am writing this article in anticipation of February when we are actually only about halfway into January. In doing research for a sermon celebrating the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., I came across a concept that informs the message I wish to share with you this month.

In our American secular society, February is often associated with love. Thanks to Hallmark, and the

candy and floral industries, we are inundated with hearts, roses, chocolates, valentine cards, and countless other opportunities to help us express our affection to those important people in our lives.

Love is certainly significant, and those of us who are in relationships can be grateful for the blessings of romantic attention from spouses, partners, or friends. But love is a complex and rich emotion that operates at other levels as well. As Dr. King pointed out in a November 1957 speech that he delivered at Dexter Avenue Church in Detroit, the Greek language actually has three different words to describe love. Though it could be argued that these terms have been slightly co-opted by Christianity, I think that they can inform our attitudes about how we express love to one another.

The first Greek term for love is *eros*. This is the type of love that tends to be the focus of February 14. Dr. King describes *eros* as being when “you find some individual [who] is attractive to you and ... you pour out all of your like and your love on that individual.”

The second Greek term is *philia*. Turning to Dr. King again, he states, “It is a sort of intimate affection between personal friends. And this is the type of love that you have for those persons that you’re friendly with, your intimate friends, or people that you call on the telephone and you go by to have dinner with, and your roommate in college and that type of thing. It’s a sort of reciprocal love. On this level, you like a person because that person likes you. You love on this level, because you are loved. You love on this level, because there’s something about the person you love that is likeable to you. This too is a beautiful love. You can communicate with a person; you have certain things in common; you like to do things together.”

The final term is *agape*. Of the three Greek words discussed here, this is perhaps the term that has the greatest association with Christianity. Dr. King explains, “*agape* is more than *eros*; *agape* is more than *philia*; *agape* is something of the understanding, creative, redemptive goodwill for all men. It is a love that seeks nothing in return. It is an overflowing love; it’s what theologians would call the love of God working in the lives of men. And when you rise to love on this level, you begin to love men, not because they are likeable, but because God loves them. You look at every man, and you love him because you know God loves him. And he might be the worst person you’ve ever seen.”

We have an *agape*-like ideal within Judaism, as well, though we may not always know how to give it expression. The value of *chesed*, showing kindness to others, is of paramount importance; rabbinic tradition teaches that the Temple in Jerusalem was destroyed due to a lack of *chesed*. It is one of the *sefirot*, the Kabbalistic emanations of God, inviting us to draw closer to the Divine as we show love to God and to one another. It is what the theologian Martin Buber aspired toward when he wrote (in his seminal work *I and Thou*) that human existence is predicated on a

quest to form a more intimate relationship with God (who, in turn, desires a similar level of intimacy with us).

And it is this level of intimacy that we should desire with one another as well. We should seek to understand each other’s joys and pains, their hopes and fears. We should hold each other up when support is needed, and celebrate with one another during happy occasions. This is what unites us as a *kehilla kedosha*, a holy congregation.

During this February, and throughout our lives, may we each know the love that we desire- through *eros*, *philia*, *agape*, and *chesed*. And may this love lead us to a more peaceful and compassionate life.

ISRAEL TRIP

After many months of review and discussion, the Board of Trustees has adopted a new policy and revised an existing policy. I wanted to outline these for you. The full policies will soon be available on our website. The new one is the Gift Acceptance Policy. Most gifts are financial and Sinai will generally accept them without any concern. On occasion, Sinai receives books, artwork, stocks, etc. These gifts will be tentatively accepted. The gifts are well-intended, but the Board must ultimately determine whether the gifts will be accepted. Many factors, such as storage/upkeep, tax implications, restrictions by the donor, etc. must be considered. The donor will be advised as soon as practicable.

We have also made revisions to the Building Use Policy. Some changes include not allowing smoking on our property (not just within the building), not taking museum items from Sinai, and prohibiting political activity or private business on the premises. The main changes to this policy, though, have to do with the process and fees. As to the process, all requests must go through the Temple Administrator. She ensures that fees are paid, space is available and no conflicts exist with other events. The policy outlines priorities should there be more than one event sought at the same time. As to fees, the policy has gone from a \$200 fee for any use by anyone to a sliding fee depending on four factors: type of event, kitchen use, setup requirements and affiliation with Sinai Temple. Fees range from \$50 to \$250.

The Gift Acceptance Policy and the revised Building Use Policy are necessary to ensure the fair and smooth operation of Sinai Temple. If you have any questions about them, feel free to contact me.

SINAI TEMPLE BOARD MEETING - January 12, 2015

- ☆ Motion to approve December 2014 minutes was made by Carmen G. All in Favor.
- ☆ Ben and Shari Fox have submitted an application for membership. Motion to accept this application was made by Paul W. All in favor.
- ☆ Randy discussed the Budget Process. Committee chairs should submit their budgets in the coming month or so. Finance will create and review a draft budget in March/April and then present it to the Board. The Board must vote on it in May to be sent to the congregation before the annual meeting on May 31.
- ☆ Finance, along with REC, will check on whether members who have upcoming life-cycle events or have received camp scholarship/awards this year are in good standing. Ideally, most or all of their pledge should be paid by the date of the event/camp. This will be determined on case by case basis.
- ☆ There was discussion about the creation of a Sanctuary Renewal Fund in honor of Art Robinson. It is needed for potential design/renovations to the sanctuary. There was discussion whether the new fund should be limited to the main sanctuary, what kind of fund, etc.
- ☆ Motion was made by Paul W. that we "Establish an Obligated Fund for the purpose of renewal of the Main Sanctuary". All in Favor.
- ☆ The REC is asking for \$3,000 for up-front costs for purchase of items for the Purim baskets, which will be reimbursed after the sales come in. Last year's sales were about \$9000 resulting in about a \$6000 profit. Motion from Finance to "Approve \$3,000 as up-front cost for purchase of items for the Purim Baskets." All in Favor.
- ☆ The proposed Gift Acceptance Policy was reviewed. As written, most gifts will be tentatively accepted, but reviewed by a committee and then the board, to determine if it is appropriate to accept the gift. Motion to approve the Gift Acceptance Policy was made by Sanford. All in favor.
- ☆ Changes to the existing Building Use Policy were discussed, including the smoking policy, use of alcohol and fees. Instead of a flat fee, it will be determined by whether the kitchen is used, if there is room set up involved, and the requestor's membership status. Motion by Sanford H. to accept the changes to the existing Building Use Policy. All in favor.

WE HAVE A NEW DISHWASHER

The Kitchen Committee in conjunction with the Board of Trustees has replaced the old, nonfunctional dishwasher with a brand new high-tech, under counter dishwasher that washes and sanitizes a load of dishes in under 2 minutes. The new DW is simple to use and has many advantages over the previous upright machine.

The operating instructions are posted on top of the DW. They are also available on the Sinai Temple website. Please take a moment to read them before you operate the machine.

Since everyone in the congregation should be able to use the DW, we are **encouraging** all members to help phase out paper/plastic goods by using our generous supply of glass plates, glasses, cups and silverware for all onegs and Kiddush luncheons. There will soon be a dedicated cart in the large pantry with all the necessary oneg/luncheon dinnerware on it. Please use what you need from the cart to set the table, then return the dried dinnerware to the cart after you have washed it in the DW. We are very excited about GOING GREEN at Sinai Temple and we ask your help.

From Our Educator

The Birthday of the Trees is quickly approaching, giving us some hope that the cold, snowy days of winter will soon be over. Tu Bishvat, a holiday whose name literally means the 15th of the Hebrew month of Shevat, falls in early February. We observe Tu Bishvat as the birthday of the trees because it is at this time that trees in the Land of Israel begin their fruit bearing cycle and emerge from their winter sleep. There is a custom to celebrate Tu Bishvat by blessing and eating various types of fruit grown on trees. Although there is no formal service for Tu Bishvat, the holiday is a wonderful opportunity to create Jewish teachable moments with your family and friends. Consider some of the ideas provided or think of your own way to celebrate Tu Bishvat.

- ☆ Have a “birthday party” for the trees—get a cake, sing happy birthday, etc. A fun way to celebrate, and everyone likes birthdays!
- ☆ Introduce your family to a fruit that they haven't tried before. Prickly pear, dragon fruit, star fruit, papaya, Buddha's hand, etc. Let everyone feel and smell the fruit, guess what it will look like inside, share what they think it will taste like, etc.
- ☆ Look up the different blessings that we say for fruits (fruits that grow on a vine vs. tree) and make a list of fruits that fit into each category.
- ☆ Research JNF (Jewish National Fund) for information about trees that grow in Israel.
- ☆ Plan a seder at home. Resources are available online (or you can contact Rabbi Jody). Taste different fruits from categories such as with pits, with edible skin, etc.

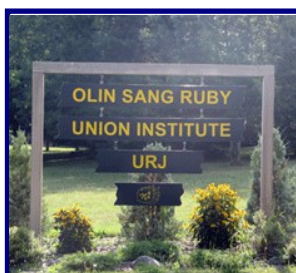
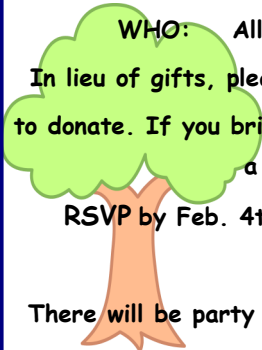

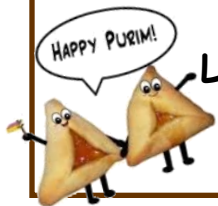
