Though Kris Kristofferson opined that "freedom's just another word for nothing left to lose" (in his song "Me and Bobby McGee; though Janis Joplin is closely associated with the song, the lyrics are by Kristofferson), we know that freedom is not something to be taken lightly. We celebrate Passover each year as a reminder of how precious our freedom is. We

understand (unlike the wicked son of the Passover *seder*) that had the redemption of the exodus not taken place, we might still be enslaved under Pharaoh's rule.

The centrality of the exodus narrative in Jewish life, the emphasis that we place on freedom, reminds us that we must not turn a blind eye toward injustices in our society that curtail individuals' freedoms. Thus, in the 1960s, Jews stood at the forefront of the Civil Rights movement in this country; in the 1970s and 1980s, the Jewish community rallied around Soviet Jewish *refuseniks* and prisoners of conscience; and we have similarly lent our voice and energy to women's rights, immigration issues, marriage equality, and other social causes that hinge upon a person's right of free expression and a value placed on the inherent worth of every human being.

Recently, the world marked the 50th anniversary of the march on Selma, Alabama, one of the watershed moments of the 1960s struggle for equality for African Americans. The recent film dramatization downplayed the role of Jews in the march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in March of 1965, but we know that members of the Jewish community (including our own emeritus rabbi, Isaac Neuman of blessed memory) were instrumental in this struggle. And numerous Jews joined with people of all faiths to commemorate the historic anniversary.

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, a close friend of Dr. King who was with him in Selma, famously remarked, "For many of us the march from Selma to Montgomery was about protest and prayer. Legs are not lips and walking is not kneeling. And yet our legs uttered songs. Even without words, our march was worship. I felt my legs were praying."

Prayer is a significant part of the religious experience. But prayer devoid of action is not sufficient to bring about change. We cannot pray for peace without taking steps to bring peace into our world. We cannot pray for an end to poverty and turn a blind eye to our neighbors who are experiencing hunger. We cannot pray for freedom and tacitly support the subjugation of minority populations. As Rabbi Heschel taught, "You cannot worship God, and then look at a human being, created by God in God's own image, as if he

or she were an animal."

Rabbi Hillel, the great sage of the Mishnaic period, observed, "In every generation, each individual must imagine that he or she personally was freed from Egypt." We must be able to understand the experience of the exodus as a defining moment in Jewish history—one that shaped our ancestors who actually made the passage from slavery into freedom, and one that continues to shape us to this day.

During the commemoration of the Selma march, President Obama gave an address in which he cited two quotes from Ralph Waldo Emerson. First he excerpted the poem, "A Nation's Strength," in which Emerson wrote of those, "Who for truth and honor's sake stand fast and suffer long." Then the president quoted from Emerson's essay *Nature*, in which he writes, "We are never tired, so long as we can see far enough."

Each of these quotes, to me, exemplifies the importance of memory, and the importance of the ongoing struggle for freedom. As we sit around our *Seder* tables, let us not only recall our people's exodus. Let us also think of the 50th anniversary of Selma. Let us also think of the 70th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz (an occasion which will be further marked later this month at our Yom HaShoah commemoration). Let us stand fast and suffer long; let us "see far enough" that we can envision (and bring nearer) the day when all are truly free.

From our family to yours, best wishes for a happy and meaningful Passover.

From the Board

As we shake off the winter blues and can feel that spring is in the air, we prepare for Passover. The story is well known. It commemorates the exodus from Egypt and our liberation from slavery. It is incumbent upon us to not just celebrate that freedom but to teach each new generation the message that the future can be better than the present. I hope you can join us for our community-wide Passover Seder on April 4 at Hillel.

On a completely different note, the ad hoc committees for the Cohen Garden and Sanctuary Renewal have both met. I want to thank the members of each committee for their hard work and for taking their responsibilities seriously. They came up with dozens of ideas to make each space more accessible, more useful and more beautiful. The next step is for the Board to discuss the recommendations of each committee. This will be done over the course of several months. When the Board believes it has an outline of the broad work to be done, the Board may retain an architect/landscape designer to draw up plans (and to make sure that what we want is feasible). The Board would then price out the work and

determine if it can be done in phases or must be done at one time. Once all of this is known, we will undertake a fundraising campaign. This entire process will take months, if not years, to bring to fruition. I am confident that, whatever the changes might be, they will take into account the needs and desires of our members and will be an enduring legacy to our children and their children.

I also want to thank the nominating committee. As of this writing, they have met and are in the process of coming up with a slate for three board trustees, financial secretary and vice-president. It is not an easy task but the committee is up to the challenge. I am confident they will find qualified and dedicated people to help lead us over the next few years.

SINAI TEMPLE BOARD OF TRUSTEES March 9, 2015

- ★ Motion to approve the February minutes made by Sanford and properly seconded. All in Favor.
- ⇒ Finance The treasurer has conducted her annual review of the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund. Jennie reports that the fund is being used appropriately and according to board policy.
- Religious Education Committee: They are recommending that, starting next fall, that non-member families be assessed a fee of \$150 per family, per school year, to be paid into the Building Fund. If families become members, payments of this non-member fee would be retroactive applied to their Building Fund obligation as members. Discussion followed. Motion made by the Religious School Committee. All in Favor.
- ★ Cemetery Committee: The Board has been discussing changes
 to the current policy to clarify some issues. There has been
 contact with committee members who have answered the
 board's concerns about such issues as heirs who do not want
 burial rights or heirs who cannot be located. A
 recommendation was made to keep copies of records at the
 Temple and to keep a contact sheet of heirs. Motion to approve
 amendments to the current cemetery policy made by Sanford
 and properly seconded. All in Favor.

- ☼ Nominating Committee: The President has properly appointed the committee members: Non-Board members - Rob Ore (chair), Bob Smith, Janie Yairi, and Jacki Loewenstein. Board members - Jennie France, Carmen Glezer, and Sanford Hess. Motion made by the President to approve the committee. All in Favor.
- ★ Membership: Gabriel and Katherine Ferrer have submitted an application for membership. Motion to accept the membership application by Jennie and properly seconded. All in favor.
- ☼ The Membership Committee sought Board input on whether to continue and/or change membership name tags. Discussion followed. Motion to continue use of name tags and to defer to the membership committee (and others) on the design, etc. made by Paul and properly seconded. All in favor.



From Our Educator

Jewish learning is fascinating to me. Many would define the job of a Jewish educator as teaching the traditions, values, mitzvot and stories that have defined Judaism for centuries. Clearly, our history hasn't changed. The stories from Tanakh are the same stories taught to our parents, grandparents, and beyond. Even though many of the 613 commandments cannot be followed today, they remain part of our Torah. It would seem, then, that being a Jewish educator would be easy. Teach the story, teach the value, and move to the next topic. However, one of the things I have learned in my years as a Jewish educator and a student of Jewish learning is that there isn't much about being Jewish that is easy. Making gefilte fish—time consuming. Understanding Talmud—complicated. Preparing for holidays—a lot of effort. And all for good reason. If persistence and dedication weren't required, we would become complacent and would not be fully engaged in being Jewish.

I read a wonderful article recently, and I would ask that each of you take the time to read it as well. One of the concepts presented that aligns perfectly with my vision for Sinai Temple Religious School is that our primary goal is for our students to foster a love of **being** Jewish. A love of being Jewish is different from a love of Judaism in so many significant ways. Our students are Jewish and they need to learn to love what this means rather than learning about Judaism. Being Jewish is something that we are all of the time, 24/7. While

running errands, playing soccer, eating a meal, learning in school, playing with friends—our Jewish identity is with us. Being Jewish requires action.

I have shared a proposal for some changes in the Religious School with the Religious Education Committee, the Sinai Temple Board and some of our teachers. In April, we will introduce electives for the students in grades 3-9. Students will continue to have a core class by grade level for a portion of the Religious School day, giving them an opportunity to learn key pieces of the curriculum. They will also spend a portion of the day in electives, working collaboratively (with multiple grades choosing from the same group of electives). My hope is that the electives will inspire teachers and that students will find Judaism to be more engaging because they will have a choice in mapping out their learning.

My vision includes a much more active school, and I hope to achieve it by involving students, teachers, parents and community members in the process. Judaism is not static—it requires involvement, activity and movement. Our school will mirror this if we recognize that our students are not here to learn about Judaism, but are here to learn about being Jewish.



The boilers brake. The lights way up in the ceiling burn out. The library floods. The toilets decide to run backwards. The back






