Topics at the meeting will include the election of new board members and approving the 2015-2016 budget. The agenda for the meeting as well as the slate of nominees, the proposed budget and other business items will be sent to members prior to the meeting.

This year there are openings for three trustees, the Vice President and Financial Secretary. At the annual meeting, we will vote on the slate of candidates presented by the nominations committee.



“Moses received the Torah at Sinai, and transmitted it to Joshua. Joshua transmitted it to the Elders, and the Elders to the Prophets, and the Prophets to the Men of the Great Assembly.” (*Pirke Avot 1: 1*) This is the traditional view of the unbroken chain that binds the Jewish people to our sacred text; in Hebrew we refer to it as “*shalsholet ha-kabbalah*.” It is the image we invoke at our B’nai Mitzvah

ceremonies, when we re-enact the passing of the Torah from generation to generation. We know that Jewish continuity over the centuries has depended on our people’s connection to the laws, traditions, and narratives contained in our holy book. Whether you believe that the words of Torah were dictated by God and transcribed by Moses, or you take a more critical view of its composition, there is no questioning the significance of the Torah in Jewish life.

According to the account given in the Torah itself, fifty days after the exodus from Egypt, the Israelites found themselves at the foot of Mount Sinai, experiencing the revelation of our sacred scripture. Our tradition tells us that not only the Israelites of that generation experienced this event, but also the souls of all who had preceded them, and of those Jews yet to be born, were present at Sinai in that moment. Just as we reenact our people’s freedom from Egypt during the Passover seder, so too are we called to reflect on messages of Torah during the festival of Shavuot.

Because of its place on our secular calendar (usually in late May or early June, when the school year is winding down and we are beginning summer plans), Shavuot is often overlooked in comparison to the other festivals of the Jewish year. That’s a shame, though. Because while all the festivals remind us of significant moments in our people’s history, serve as festive convocations, and link us to our past in significant ways, it is Shavuot which in large part is responsible for defining the modern Jewish experience. Shavuot is celebrated as *Zman Matan Torateinu*, the season of the giving of our Torah, and there is no denying how central our sacred text is to understanding Jewish life.

Whether one adheres to all of the *mitzvot* or none of them, whether one considers the text to be the work of God or the work of man, Torah permeates our lives: it gives us moral guidance, it permeates our liturgy, and it tells our people’s story. And a significant part of that story is our covenantal relationship with God. In accepting the Torah, we forged a bond with the deity, promising to treasure its lessons throughout the generations. It is a covenant that has stood even in our people’s darkest hours, as our ancestors clung to the Torah through pogroms and concentration camps, and were martyred with words of Torah upon their lips.

Each Shavuot, we have an opportunity to renew this covenant.

Perhaps most significantly, we do so through our young people, as our tenth grade Confirmation class leads us in worship, reading from the Ten Commandments (a traditional study text for Shavuot), and individually affirming his or her relationship with our sacred traditions and with the divine. This year, we have three students celebrating this milestone: Zoe Goldenfeld, Miriam Ross, and Ruth Sussman. Each of these young ladies has dedicated herself to engaging in continued Jewish studies. During this year we have explored issues such as ethics, Jewish theology, and the role of women in Judaism as they have each worked to articulate their place within Jewish society. We invite you to celebrate with these students and their families on Erev Shavuot, May 23, 2015, as they lead a service of Confirmation in celebration of the festival and in celebration of their achievements.

On the second morning of Shavuot, Monday, May 25, the Egalitarian Traditional Minyan will have festival morning worship services beginning at 10 AM. During this service, the *Yizkor* memorial prayers will be recited as we call to mind the beloved members of our families and our community who transmitted Torah to us and helped to link us to *shalsholet ha-kabbalah*, the chain of tradition.

Please mark your calendars and plan to join us as we affirm our commitment to the lessons of Torah.

Many of you may be familiar with the “If you give a pig a pancake” story where, in the end, you loop back to the beginning of wanting to give the pig a pancake. The same could be said at Sinai. “If the Temple President has an idea, he will form a committee to explore the options. If the President forms a committee then a member will want to bake a dessert for the group. If that member bakes a dessert then....”

As my time winds down, I have formed a lot of committees and eaten a lot of desserts along the way (to the chagrin of my waistline). Sinai Temple is on the right path. We have good people to lead us. But there are always things we can do to enhance our experiences. The ad hoc committees regarding the Cohen garden and sanctuary renewal have met and given their thoughts to the Board which will review them and map out the next steps. The Board has begun discussing the budget for next year and is reviewing ways in which to cut expenses, including making the

building more energy efficient in the long-term. And after many months of review, the Board adopted an emergency manual. This outlines who is in charge during emergencies, lists the location of emergency kits and devices and puts into words the best practices should there be life-threatening events at the temple. We have already established a CPR class on June 7, after which those in attendance will be prepped on the manual.

Even during these pleasant spring months, the Board will continue to meet and work. I hope this springtime brings you happiness and joy as you spend more time outdoors - perhaps to walk or play ball or plant a garden. Perhaps Sinai Temple could create a garden which feeds the needy and brings us flowers for our bima? What a great idea. Maybe I'll create a committee.....

SINAI TEMPLE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

April 13, 2015

- ✧ Motion to approve the March 2015 minutes was made by Sanford, 2nd by Jennie. All in Favor. Jesse Tedrick from Alpha Controls and Services presented a proposal for his heating/air-conditioning company to provide a maintenance service contract to Sinai. They would do routine maintenance to ensure that our systems are functioning properly and to reduce the chances of repairs being needed. He also presented a proposal to install new controllers on the system that would all him to monitor systems for problems. He discussed other issues. The Board will review the proposals.
- ✧ We have received 230 pledges (180 paid in full, 34 partial payment, 16 no payment). There are still 46 pledges not yet received. If everyone pledges and pays, we will bring in about \$5,000 less than last year.
- ✧ Rabbi Jody is piloting a new program for grades 3 – 9, with electives being offered. The students were excited about it. The school calendar for next year is being developed.
- ✧ The nominating committee continues to do its work to fill vacancies. They must announce the slate at least 30 days before the annual meeting, which is scheduled for May 31. The sanctuary and Cohen gardens ad hoc committees submitted their recommendations. The Board will review them and determine the next steps (e.g. hire designers, etc.)
- ✧ The temple's emergency plan is a policy manual but also an informational guide - where to find defibrillators, where to meet outside in the event of a fire or other emergency, and identifying who is in charge. Motion made by Sanford and 2nd by Jennie to approve the document, with the understanding that the building committee will review it annually and recommend any changes to the board. All in Favor.
- ✧ A tentative Budget was presented from Finance and discussed. More accurate numbers for the current fiscal year will be available by next month's board meeting – at which time the board must approve of the budget.




