From Rabbi Alan Cook's Desk

"There's a land that I see/ Where the children are free/ And I say it ain't far/ To this land from where we are."

These are the opening lyrics to the title song from the album "Free to Be . . . You and Me." Released in November 1972, by Marlo Thomas in collaboration with the Ms. Foundation for Women, the music (and a subsequent television special) was a familiar part of my childhood. Some parts of the project may seem dated or hokey nowadays; certainly the musical styles and the clothing the performers wear are both very much artifacts of the early 1970s. Yet many of the messages that Thomas and her collaborators were attempting to share continue to resonate today.

The title song is but one example. It posits a simple yet significant message: let's envision a world in which every child can have the freedom to explore his or her interests and skills; where every individual can be celebrated for his or her unique qualities; where no one attempts to pigeonhole a person based on his or her gender, race, or socio-economic background. I don't believe that such a world exists only in the realm of imagination; I think we have the opportunity and responsibility to work to make it a reality. Indeed, to do so is to embrace the Jewish value *v'ahavta l'rei'acha kamocha*—love your neighbor as yourself. Or, as Rabbi Hillel famously put it, "What is hateful to you, do not do to any person."

When you read this, we recently will have concluded our celebration of Purim. We celebrate Esther's ability to discern how her unique position and talents could make a difference in the land of Persia and rescue the Jews from their scheduled annihilation. Now as we prepare to commemorate Passover, celebrating our ancestors' important journey from slavery to freedom, we are called to recognize that only when all are free can we truly be free.

Rabbi Hillel taught, "Bechol dor vador chayav adam lir'ot et atzmo k'ilu hu yatza mi-Mitzrayim—In every generation, one must behave as though he or she personally was redeemed from Egypt." Only by immersing ourselves in the Exodus narrative and expressing true appreciation for our freedom can we learn to be empathetic to others' needs for physical, spiritual and emotional freedoms.

Let us continue to strive for the day when "you and me are free to be . . . you and me."

The month of March is when we as a Temple begin the process of planning for the coming year. This involves consideration of two very important items, the budget for the next fiscal year and the composition of the Board for the next term.

The Board and the Finance Committee receive input from all the committees and other groups within the Temple to assess our financial needs for next year. Of course, we would like nothing better than to be able to grant every request for funds, but the other side of the ledger must also be considered. Our income is not unlimited, so we have to be selective in our choice of fundable projects. It is our duty as officers of the Temple to manage the Temple's resources in the best way we can, so sometimes we need to deny or postpone expenses. We appreciate everyone's help and understanding in making this process run smoothly.

As you know, Board members and officers have term limits in our Temple, so each year we convene a committee composed of members of the Board and members of the congregation to find individuals who are willing to take on these responsibilities for the coming year. This is a wonderful opportunity to serve the community and develop skills you may not be aware that you possess. You also get to meet and interact with some great people you might not otherwise encounter. So, if you receive a call from this committee inviting you to join the Board or to serve as an officer of the Temple, please give it careful consideration. You don't think you'd be good at it? You won't know until you try, and we will give you every assistance in learning how!

At the end of March, we begin the celebration of Passover. In the Seder each year, we retell and relive the miracle of Exodus, the classic story of liberation and redemption that has inspired not only our own people but all people of the world. In many ways, Passover is the most important holiday of the year, because it marks the beginning of our identity as Jews and is the source of our empathy and compassion for those in our world still enduring slavery and injustice. We are reminded many times in the Torah of our responsibility to welcome and care for the strangers among us, because we know better than anyone else what it is to be a stranger in a strange land.

One of my favorite events of the year is the Interfaith Seder, which we'll be celebrating this year on March 25. The Seder last year was so successful and so moving to all who participated that we've decided to make it an annual event. When I attended the URJ Biennial in Boston last December, I was gratified to learn that many other congregations across the country have also created similar celebrations in cooperation with other faith communities. This is a tangible manifestation of the Torah's teaching, and I am proud of our congregation for hosting it. If you came to last year's event, you know how much fun we had. If you didn't, I hope you'll give it a try this year. Be watching for announcements in the weekly email blasts, and get your reservations in early, because space is limited.

Just a word about the recent Trivia Night fundraiser. Wow! My thanks and praise go out to the organizers and to all of you who contributed your time, money, baked goods and enthusiasm! Not only did we raise money for the Temple, but I think you'll agree that we also raised our level of community spirit to a new high! We'll definitely consider making this an annual event as well!

FEATURED FUNDS OF THE MONTH

LIBRARY FUND

One day, a farmer was working in the field with his sick horse. Two days later, the horse returned from the mountain followed by a dozen younger and healthier horses. Upon seeing this, the neighbor exclaimed, "How fortunate you are! You must be very happy." The farmer replied, "Maybe so, maybe not. We'll see."

The next day, the farmer's only son was working to train the new horses when one of them threw the son to the ground. The son broke his leg and was unable to continue working until it was healed. The neighbor quickly approached the farmer and said, "What a tragedy! You will have to do all the work by yourself now." The farmer replied, "Maybe so, maybe not. We'll see."

Several days later, all of the young men in the village were drafted into the army. The farmer's son was deemed unfit because of his broken leg. "How fortunate!" cried the neighbor

as his own sons were marched away. The farmer replied, "Maybe so, maybe not. We'll see."

Although not from our tradition, this story echoes the Jewish saying, "gam zeh ya'avor—this too shall pass." When we are faced with a challenging situation or a tragedy, it is up to us to decide how we will react. Facing adversity is not new to us we are reminded over and over that this is one of the things that keeps Judaism alive. While we cannot control a situation, we do have the power to react and to create a change so that ultimately, even something horrible can result in something positive. Also, as demonstrated in the story above, if something seems to be going amazingly well, there is value in realizing that the situation can change in an instant. We can't ever stop doing our work to make the world a better place, because in that moment, when we feel everything is great, will also pass. There is a rabbinic passage that says, "gam zu la tovah—this is also for good." In this season of celebrating freedom and overcoming adversity, between the time of Purim and Passover, consider how your choices to act and react can influence the outcome of a situation.
