Recently, I accompanied our son, Gabe, on his sixth grade class field trip to the City Museum of St. Louis. If you are not familiar with this facility, it is a conglomeration of slides, climbing structures, tunnels, and other curiosities built into part of an old shoe warehouse. The founder of the museum, the late artist Bob Cassily, added pieces to the museum according to his own eccentric design. At times, this makes the whole of the institution a confusing maze, as there appears to be little rhyme or reason to the floorplan, and one can easily become discombobulated.

Perhaps the City Museum's layout is an apt metaphor for the complexities of human relationships. At times, we seem to fit together quite nicely with our neighbors; at other times conflicting ideals and sensibilities put us at odds with one another. Rarely do we have a guide map to assist us in making sense of these intricacies. We are left to feel our way through and hope that our best intentions will somehow mesh with the beliefs and behaviors of those with whom we find ourselves interacting. It can be a messy process, to be sure, but if we can have the courage to engage with others even in the face of certain ideologies that may threaten to divide us, it is possible that we will emerge enriched by the experience of such interaction. There is strength in numbers and there is joy in community. A potential ally who differs from us on some issues is still, at the end of the day, an ally.

Within the Jewish community (particularly within the local C-U Jewish community), we know that we have diversity in thought and practice. Much like the City Museum, our Jewish life here in east central Illinois at first glance can appear to be a disjointed assemblage of personalities, we do our best to come together to ensure that Jewish culture, worship, and values are proudly celebrated. We can be proud of the wide range of touchpoints that we offer here at Sinai Temple. From English services to Reform services to Egalitarian Traditional services; from Religious School programs to Adult Education to special classes for the Israeli community; from social programs to Shabbat dinners to community events; we offer multitudes of ways for people to explore and express their Judaism.

In the broader community, we work closely with other Jewish institutions. We have worked with Chabad and with the Judaic Studies program at UIUC on events, and we are pleased to have ongoing and rich collaborations with CUJF and with UIUC Hillel.

There are two projects to which I particularly would like to draw your attention. The first is the CU community Eruv. Under the guidance of Rabbi Shlomo Schachter, the OU JLIC rabbi at Hillel, the *eruv* was established in our community, which creates a boundary within the community in which things may be carried on Shabbat or festivals. This makes travel on Shabbat less restrictive, and makes settling in CU more attractive for those who would like to seek out a community with an *eruv*.

A component of an *eruv* is that it must have food which can be shared by the community. Work is underway to expand upon this concept by developing a food bank that the CU Jewish community can share with the less fortunate in our midst. More information will be available in the coming months about how our congregation will be involved in the fulfillment of this *mitzvah*.

The other project which I'd like to highlight is that a section of John St. (where Hillel is located) has been approved to be designated as honorary Rabbi Ben Frankel Way, in memory of Rabbi Frankel and his tremendous contributions to our community. Rabbi Frankel was 24 years old in 1923, serving as part-time rabbi of Sinai Temple, when he founded Hillel at the University of Illinois. Today that institution has grown into an international organization found on more than 500 campuses worldwide. We will join with our friends from Hillel to celebrate this designation, and the legacy of Rabbi Frankel, at a block party on August 30. More details will follow.

We are excited and proud of both these events which show the continued vibrancy of our Jewish community, and we look forward to continued strong partnerships.

Thank you to Robin Goettel and Linda Weiner, who organized the recent Spa Day Fundraiser at the Temple. Those of us who came got to learn some techniques for relaxation, centering and self-awareness, and then we all got together for some delicious smoothies. The event was a big success! I hope they'll consider doing it again next year, because it was a great way to spend a Sunday afternoon!

As I write this, I am still basking in the pleasure of having attended on May 11 the Erev Shabbat service led by the B'nai Mitzvah class. If I ever entertained doubts about the future of our Temple and of the Jewish people, they are gone now. These kids are amazing! They exhibit knowledge and poise way beyond their years one moment, and then the next moment, they're kids again! That they love and respect each other and their teacher Sara Topolosky is there for all to see. Their teacher from a previous year, Eric Herbach, drove from his home in the Chicago area just to be a surprise guest at the service, and I know how much the class appreciated reconnecting with him. I can only describe my own feelings being with them last Friday night as joyful. It was a privilege to be present—thanks to everybody who participated, both in the service and in the bountiful oneg we had afterwards!

The Temple slows down a little in the summer. There's no Religious School, and there won't be another Bulletin until August. Nevertheless, the Temple staff is still hard at work making sure that everything runs smoothly. Many of our kids and both our rabbis go to various Jewish summer camps for varying lengths of time. I have been given the great honor this year of being invited, as a Temple President, to attend OSRUI, the URJ camp in Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, for a weekend in July. As most of you know, I was not Jewish as a

child, so I never got to go to camp. I'm really looking forward to sharing a special weekend with the kids and camp leaders!

One thing I do plan to do this summer is send out the final FY18 revenue and expenses sometime in the month of July. What we sent out in the Annual Report that was presented at the Annual Meeting on May 20 was our best projection of the final figures, but a projection is only an educated guess. The Temple staff and I will put together the same kind of financial report you received last month with the FY18 Budget, the FY18 Actual, and the FY19 Budget for your information. # SINAI TEMPLE MAY 2018 BOARD MEETING

- ★ Emily Hindin has pledged to Sinai Temple a very generous donation in memory of her parents, Blanche and Seymour Sudman, z.l., to support the construction of a patio at the Cohen Garden. The Board is delighted to accept Emily's offer. Construction will begin soon.
- The Board approved unanimously the plans Jake Rosenbaum put forward for a playground to be built in the area north of the Temple. This is a project that Jake proposed in partial fulfillment of the requirements for becoming an Eagle Scout. He has come to speak with the Board several times, and we are very impressed with all the work he has put in on the project.
- As an added feature of the playground, Rabbi Jody proposed putting in a "Gaga Pit." Gaga is a game similar to dodgeball played in a hexagonal enclosure. It is a popular game at Jewish summer camps, and the addition of the pit to the new playground represents a minimal expense. The Board approved this project as well.
- As part of an effort to increase security for the Temple, the Building Committee recently oversaw the installation of a new Access Control System.

# Dear Parents and Friends of the Sinai Temple Religious School,

We just finished a wonderful year and the school is thriving. Under the leadership of Rabbi Jody, we have seen curricular innovation with the addition of enrichment and creative programming like the Genizah project.

We have a young and enthusiastic staff, most of whom are students at the U of I. They work hard to educate our children to love Judaism and to channel its values.

But they can't and shouldn't be the only staff at our school.

I'm writing to encourage you to consider becoming a part of the school by teaching. In my experience – and I started working at a Sunday school in 1979 when I was in 9<sup>th</sup> grade -- the combination of parent teachers with university students is the best balance of age, background, and experience. Each group has expertise and skill: the younger teachers bring vitality and excitement while the parent teachers bring knowledge and a certain gravitas. The synergy between the two groups results in creativity, energy and student learning!! We know you are busy and that Sunday mornings are precious time to catch up and get ready for the week ahead. On the other hand, the energy of the classroom is infectious.

And there is a lot of support. The madrichim provide support to the teachers in the classroom. The resource room is stocked with ideas for dynamic lessons. In Midrash Rabbah, the text teaches us that when the Israelites stood at the base of Mount Sinai, waiting to receive the precious gift of Torah from God, they were told that their children would be the guarantors. In other words, when God asked them for a guarantee that they would accept the Torah (instruction) and "na'aseh v'nishmah" (do and listen), they first offered their parents, then the prophets, and finally their children. It was not until they said that the children would be the guarantors that God accepted and shared with them the Torah. We were all at Sinai, and we all were witness to beautiful, magical revelation. We recently celebrated Shavuot, a reminder of this event when we stood at Sinai to receive the commandments. To help the kids in our community grasp the wonder, to help our guarantors connect to the importance of Judaism and Torah, we went to Colbert Park in Savoy for a 10 Commandments scavenger hunt that ended on top of "Mount Sinai". We also made ice cream (dairy treats are customary on Shavuot) in a can, floral headbands, read a story and played with friends on the playground!


