

From Rabbí Alan Cook's Desk



I am writing this piece having just returned from my first month of sabbatical time and from the Union for Reform Judaism's Biennial convention. I am grateful to have had the opportunity to take the sabbatical time for reflection and study, and to attend the Biennial in order to be inspired by leaders, thinkers, and musicians from throughout the Jewish community.

During the time that I was out of the office, I was not detached from the realities impacting Jewish life. In the past month, there have been a number of worrisome incidents perpetrated against Jews, including (but sadly, not limited to) the murder of hostages at a kosher supermarket in Jersey City, New Jersey; antisemitic attacks on a subway passenger in New York; and the wanton vandalism and destruction of Torah scrolls at a Sephardic synagogue in Beverly Hills, California. These are merely some of the worrisome domestic incidents; international acts of antisemitism also have been reported.

There's an old curse (dubiously accredited to the Chinese) that says, "May you live in interesting times." Certainly, it has been an "interesting" time period for the Jewish people. Many of us might prefer a bit less "interest," which might help us feel a bit more secure about our place in the world. Given our innate human tendency to enter into "fight or flight" responses when we feel threatened, it's hardly surprising that in the face of recent developments, many Jews are carefully weighing their options for the future.

But during the URJ Biennial, we had the opportunity to hear from Dr. Deborah Lipstadt, who offered a different

perspective on current events—one that may allow us to shift our thinking and find hope. Dr. Lipstadt, the Dorot Professor of Modern Jewish History and Holocaust Studies at Emory University, challenged us to ask ourselves whether Jews have become too focused on antisemitism. She asked whether we have, in her words, focused more on the "oy" in our lives than the joy in our lives.

Certainly news reports of violence against Jews or vandalism against Jewish institutions are worrisome and unsettling, but Dr. Lipstadt argues that we cannot allow such concerns to become all-consuming. She recounted the story of one of her students, who confided that he had begun wearing a kippah as an act of defiance in response to these recent antisemitic occurrences. She said that her student's action actually made her sad, because the student was adopting this practice not out of personal conviction and not because he derived personal meaning from the donning of a kippah, but because he saw it as a means of resistance. Dr. Lipstadt noted that we should not be allowing anti-Semites to dictate our Jewish practices in such a manner.

As we enter 2020, undoubtedly many will make puns on the year and tell us to be clear-eyed in our vision for the future. So before it becomes cliché, let me jump on that bandwagon: I think it is crucial that we keep a clear perspective on the world around us. We can remain vigilant against words of hate or antisemitic acts. But we can also maintain our Jewish pride and find joy in Jewish life and practice. That too is a great and important defense against encroaching bigotry.

I wish you all a sweet and meaningful [secular] New Year, filled with health and blessing.

Foundation for the Future

The renovation project is in a slowly moving phase while our architects solicit bids from contractors for our project. We are following the best practice of an "Integrated Design" approach—this means that we find our contractors first, (before the next phase of designs are created) so that the contractor is part of the design process. This approach allows the contractor to shape the design for cost considerations as we go, instead of coming in after the designs are done and changing everything. So extra effort now to line up our contractors will pay dividends later when we can quickly move from design into the construction phase, which is still planned to begin in late October 2020.

The current phase is slow because getting bids takes time. First, our architects communicate the type of work we need, then the contractors decide what their cost would be for the work. This can require some back-andforth discussions. Once the bids are in place, we can choose the best option. Although this will usually be the lowest price, there are some factors that could cause us to choose a different bid—such as experience and quality. We are also finding that the C-U construction boom is working against us, because companies are busy with lots of other work. Some contractors are choosing not to bid on our work at all, so more effort is required to contact additional groups.

The Board of Trustees is playing its important role by reviewing and approving the appropriate agreements. Meanwhile, the Renovation Committee will continue to push the process along and review the contractor bids.

<u>Green Team Tip</u>

If you have cartons and packing material around the home, you might likely flatten the cartons to put with your recycle. Another approach is to keep in mind that they accept clean cartons and packing material at CU Pack "N" Ship, 2206 W. Springfield, Champaign. They do not pay for used cartons and packing materials, but will accept these (including clean polystyrene packing peanuts, which cannot be recycled). They will reuse the packing materials for packages they ship, and you can purchase new and used cartons there, a great way to support reuse of materials.
