# From Rabbí Alan Cook's Desk





By the time you read this, I will be in the midst of my second monthlong sabbatical period for 2019-2020. I am grateful to the board for having generously granted me this time for intensified study, writing, and professional growth. I am also thankful to the many individuals who gave of their time and energy during my first month of sabbatical in November/December, and extend my gratitude to those who

will take on roles during my February absence.

During my February sabbatical, I will once again be engaging in reading, writing, and studying. I also will have the opportunity to visit Israel. It is hard for me to believe that this will be my first trip in almost eleven years!

I have the honor of serving as a chaperone for the "Ta'am Israel" ("a taste of Israel") trip, sponsored by the Jewish United Fund of Chicago. This trip, which has been operating for many years, affords eighth graders in the Chicago area the opportunity to travel to Israel with their peers for a week-long trip. Beginning last year, JUF expanded the trip to allow our students to participate. Last year, Norah Kopolow attended; this year, Nessa Bleill and Gabe Cook will be on the trip.

I am excited to go to Israel to help guide these students and frame their experiences. The bulk of my energies during the trip will be focused on this goal. But beyond this practical purpose, why am I going to Israel?

In a speech at Rice University in 1962, as the United States prepared to enter the "space race," President John F. Kennedy noted, "We choose to go to the Moon . . . not because [it is] easy, but because [it is] hard." Israel is a challenging place, and some might say that these challenges make travel there hard. But I think that facing these challenges can reveal hope and beauty and immeasurable rewards.

I choose to go to Israel because of the historic ties between our people and this sacred land, attested to in our scriptures. To walk and study where our patriarchs and matriarchs are said to have lived, and where pioneers of more recent generations built and innovated and dreamed is an aweinspiring experience.

I choose to go to Israel for the opportunity to interact with all of her wonderfully diverse citizenry: Jews, Muslims, Christians, Baha'I, and Druze. I look forward to conversations with those who profess a faith that connects them inextricably to this complicated place and with those who adhere to no particular faith but nonetheless recognize the deep and complex beauty of this country.

I choose to go to Israel to remind myself that Jews are not monolithic, that in this unique Jewish country I will encounter progressive Jews like myself living and working alongside Orthodox Jews and *chiloni* ("secular") Jews who each parse their heritage in different ways. The students and I will see Ashkenazim, Sepharadim, and Mizrachis—Jews of every skin tone, gender identity, socio-economic class, and national origin.

I choose to go to Israel so that I can continue to better be able to explore and articulate the complex issues driving Israeli politics. I will speak out about the missteps I perceive on the path towards peace, and on my personal disagreement with Israel's leaders and their policies. I will continue to lift my voice in support of Israel living up to the highest potential of its founders' ideals and dreams.

These are but a few of the goals that will be on my heart and mind as I take this trip. I look forward to sharing my reactions with you, and to our students sharing their responses as well.

# From our Educator Rabbi Jody Cook



Although we are just starting the second book of the Torah, the book of Shemot (or Exodus), I wanted to give you some significant NUMBERS related to Sinai Temple Religious School. We will actually read from the book of Numbers (bamidbar) over the summer—but numbers and counting are important in the Jewish world.

- 1. In about a month, we will deliver over 300 shalach manot, Purim Gift Baskets. This fundraiser will (hopefully) generate over \$10,000 in sales, but more importantly, it will connect our membership and Jewish families in CU. I encourage you to participate and support Sinai Temple Religious School by sending a greeting to friends!
- 2. I just received confirmation that we have 20 children going to OSRUI this summer and several other students are attending different Jewish summer camps. This is HUGE for a small community. Informal Jewish education is beneficial for so many reasons, and I can't wait to hear about the experiences that these kids have!
- 3. Later this month, 2 students from our Hebrew High program will participate in an 8th grade peer trip to Israel. Last year, when we introduced the program, one student was able to participate. We will send Nessa Bleill and Gabe Cook off on a journey with a blessing for safe arrival and return and a for a trip of spiritual growth, learning and friendship making.
- 4. 3,996—the number of small, square stickers our community members put onto a mosaic poster. It is still hanging in the foyer—because it is fun to look at and talk about. It was started and completed by people in our congregation who were at Sinai Temple to celebrate Hanukkah! What a fun community building activity!

Champaign-Urbana Jewish Federation CHAI Seniors Program invites you to Lunch Conversation with Local Artists about Their Art, Lives and Businesses.

This will be the first of a series of lunch-and-learn events designed to introduce members of our CU Jewish community who work in the arts, business, services, academia, government and religious organizations. In each meeting, two to four speakers representing one of these areas will share a bit about their lives, experiences and work.

The upcoming lunch-and-learn will be a moderated conversation and Q-and-A session with local artists. Our guests are Jacki Loewenstein (theater), Arielle Weinstein (music), Jon Dessen and Larry Kanfer (photography).

Lunch will be served. Cost of this is event is \$5.00. Presentation starts at 12:00 pm.



In December, we received bids from consultants on different aspects of the building. After a careful review, the project is moving

forward with contracts for Structural Engineering and MEP (Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing) design. Both are important for the design phase; Structural Engineers will review the status of the roof over the Library and Levin Lounge, while the MEP consultants will assist with the heating/cooling system and the bathroom renovations.

In the next phase of design, consultants will provide input on Acoustics, Audio/Visual, Lighting, and the IT that connects these all together. We are still gathering bids from those consultants and hope to have companies selected by the end of February.

A similar processing is occurring for the General Contractor. Sixteen local contractors were contacted and 6 expressed interest in our project. We hope to have several bids to choose from, although we might be limited by the building surge going on in the C-U area. The General Contractor is going to be brought into the process early, during the design phase, to be part of the team that is making decisions during the phase when it's easy to make changes . . . and not after all the blueprints are complete.

2020 is going to be an exciting year for the Renovation Project, and the goal remains to start construction in late October. The Sinai Renovation Committee will do everything in our power to make sure that we're ready.
