From Rabbi Alan Cook's Desk



It seems cliché to note that this is an unusual moment. Pundits, politicians, school principals, employers and employees, chancellors and deans, and friends on social media all seem to point that out in every message we receive from them. As if we needed reminding—our routines

have been disrupted, events have been postponed, and we're becoming more proficient in virtual networking than we ever dreamed we could be. Yet we persist in marking this time as "unique" or "unprecedented," as if semantics alone can forestall these adaptations we've made from becoming permanent fixtures of our routine.

I don't know when or how we will get things under control and return to "normal." At Sinai Temple, we'll look to the medical and scientific experts for guidance on that, and we are fortunate to have a great local team at CU Public Health Districts to advise us on best practices. We can be grateful for their hard work, and for the dedication of many talented medical professionals and first responders throughout our community and throughout the world, who have been on the front lines of this battle to try to contain the spread of this pandemic.

In the meantime, I hope that you are doing well and staying safe and healthy. As Jake Sosnoff notes in his message to you this month, we continue to check in on one another, and we continue to pursue different avenues for maintaining virtual connections through services, classes, conversations, and programming.

We are sending a shortened version of the April Bulletin that will only be available on the Temple webpage. This is being done because of the lack of events at the Temple and to decrease volunteer and staff contact in the mailing process.

We are taught, "Do not stand idle while your neighbor bleeds." This important instruction takes on a new meaning in the context of responding to this global pandemic. Even if we feel healthy and unlikely to be at risk of being personally impacted by this virus, we must recognize that our neighbors may be "bleeding." Those who are immunocompromised or bear other risk factors related to age or illness rely on the rest of us not to stand idle, but to participate in isolation and other containment measures so that all of us are protected.

Our Passover Haggadah reminds us, "Even if all of us were wise, all of us understanding, all of us knowing the Torah, we would still be obligated to consider the exodus from a narrow place; and everyone who considers the exodus from a narrow place in great detail is praiseworthy." All of us living in the midst of this pandemic are confronting our own *Mitzrayim*, our own narrow places, our own places where our movements and actions and behaviors are constricted. The virus does not discriminate based on how learned or how religiously observant one is; each of us must equally engage in responding responsibly and appropriately.

One final thought (for now) from our textual tradition: Hillel said, "In a place where no one is acting like a human being, one must nevertheless strive to be a human being." In this unusual time (there's that word again), we may occasionally become angsty, frustrated and/or impatient. But it's important that we strive not to let those behaviors overcome our better nature. Even if others are not acting like *mensches*, let us still labor to be kind and compassionate to one another.


