

From Rabbí Alan Cook's Desk



It seems that every January, I write a bulletin article either heralding the approach of the secular New Year or talking about the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. as we prepare to commemorate his birthday. Both of these are significant milestones and certainly worthy of recognition. But in an effort to be creative this year, I took to Wikipedia. Reading up on

holidays and observances that fall in January, I discovered that the last Monday in January (January 27 this year) has been proclaimed "Bubble Wrap Appreciation Day."

Bubble Wrap is one of those products that is a "proprietary eponym." That is, one company, the aptly named "Sealed Air Corporation," owns a trademark on the name "Bubble Wrap," but it is so synonymous with that product that even lookalike products not manufactured by the copyright holder are still generally known by that name. The product was invented in 1957, and the company was incorporated in 1960. A radio station in Bloomington, Indiana, appears to have introduced the "holiday" in 2001.

Most of us have known the satisfaction of sitting down with a sheet of Bubble Wrap and methodically popping each bubble. There is something about the exercise that is calming and refocusing (I don't know about you, but for me, the larger air cushions that now insulate many packages from Amazon and other shippers just don't offer the same satisfaction). There are even phone apps that strive to re-create the experience virtually.

But if you'll permit me to coin a metaphor here, I think that Bubble Wrap can serve as a symbol for the reality most of us are experiencing as we each have responded to the challenges of living within the COVID-19 pandemic. We have striven to protect ourselves and those in our immediate circles from the dangers of the virus by staying closer to home, wearing our masks, and maintaining distance from one another. All of these have been, and continue to be, important and worthy precautions that are consistent with scientific recommendations and have been shown to have limited community spread. But we must ensure that our bubbles of protection, while they insulate against the illness, do not isolate us from the important connections that so enrich our lives.

Sinai Temple continues to be a vibrant community. We continue to share in one another's simchas, and to lift up one another in times of hardship. We continue to create moments

of holiness as we learn and pray together and enjoy one another's company, even if we are physically distanced from one another. And we look forward to the day when it will be safe to fully pop all the bubbles, to rid ourselves of the insulating barriers that have kept us apart over the many months of the pandemic, and to come together in celebration.

Until that moment arrives, I pray that we all will stay safe and healthy. I wish you a very happy secular New Year. May 2021 bring health, happiness, and blessing for us all.

Foundation for the Future

December was a busy month for the renovation. In quick succession, two versions of the construction drawings were created. First there was a "90% version", which we reviewed carefully with the General Contractor and used to make some small adjustments. For example, down to the level of detail of where outlets would be located on the East wall. After that feedback was absorbed, a final version of the drawings was submitted to the city for permit review on December 21st. The city will review the drawings and possibly request changes. At the end of their approval process, they will issue building permits, which are necessary to begin construction. We are still targeting a February start for that work.

Another stage in the process has also begun: our General Contractor has begun taking bids from sub-contractors for specialty work like Electricians and Heating/Cooling. Each of these is bigger than you might expect! Electrical work includes also the Audio-Visual components, so that will include all of the microphones, speakers, video-cameras, and screens. (Given how successful online services have been during the pandemic, we're making sure that there's an ability to broadcast services from the Sanctuary after we're back in the building.) Heating & Cooling work involves an almost complete re-do of the way the air is spread throughout the Sanctuary and Pods. Better air dispersal will give us more effective control, but doesn't require replacing the heat pumps with a different system.

Finally, with so many of the core construction components defined, in January the SRC will be turning its attention to some of the final details – like the type of chairs, colors for the finishes, and selection of the furniture pieces (for example, in the Levin Lounge).

We are looking forward to an exciting 2021, and we hope that future updates might even have pictures to show the construction progress.
