# From Rabbí Alan Cook's Desk





The Jewish value of *hachnasat orchim*, welcoming guests, is an important one. The Union for Reform Judaism began promoting "Audacious Hospitality" as a key goal for its member congregation, and it's a precept we've tried to adopt. Though COVID has caused us to place our food-related events on hold for the time being, we do look forward to the eventual return of our First Fridays, which allowed

us to share the joy and company of a Shabbat dinner together.

So, I can understand why a rabbi, seeing an individual approach a synagogue building looking cold and uncomfortable, might invite that individual in for a cup of hot tea and some conversation.

As has been widely reported by now, this is how Rabbi Charlie Cytron-Walker began his Shabbat morning on January 15. He ended it more than eleven hours later, when he and three congregants finally were able to escape from their captor. Thankfully, all were physically unharmed.

In the wake of this ordeal, Rabbi Charlie has been asked if he would extend the same hospitality if he had the chance to do it all again. He has replied that indeed he would.

None of us can truly know how we will respond to a given situation until we do indeed find ourselves in that situation. But I think Rabbi Charlie's larger point is this: we must not let isolated bad actors destroy our instinct for goodness. We must not allow them to make us callous and closed off to the broader world. Rabbi Cantor Angela Buchdahl, who was also drawn into the hostage crisis by the perpetrator demanding to speak with her, preached the following weekend that we must not permit others to force us into making our synagogues and gathering places into fortresses. We are fortunate to have safeguards in place to protect all who come to Sinai Temple. While it would not be prudent to list all of them in print, they include alarm systems and physical security features in our building, along with ongoing positive relationships with the Champaign Police Department and other law enforcement and security personnel. We will take precautions, but we will not cower.

I firmly believe that the alternative that we must embrace to building fortresses is the building of bridges. I continue to be proud that Sinai Temple maintains positive relationships within the local interfaith community. Many faith leaders and laypeople reached out with messages of support and solidarity following the incidents in Colleyville, just as they did in the past after the incidents at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, and at Chabad of Poway. By being in conversation with people of other faiths, by extending our hands and hearts to them, we create a network that will stand with us when we face challenges.

We won't always see eye-to-eye with our non-Jewish neighbors on every issue. But by building and continually reinforcing our connections, we learn how to respectfully disagree and how to lovingly challenge one another's preconceptions. We cannot allow our hurt and fear and frustration to present itself as Islamophobia or racism or xenophobia or bigotry. We must resolutely stand for mutual understanding and respect. Together, let us build a brighter tomorrow.

### SINAI TEMPLE JANUARY 2022 BOARD MEETING

Rabbi Alan meaningfully connected the annual memorial of MLK Jr with the Sabbath of Shirah and its moving Song of Sea in his D'var Torah. He highlighted the piece, "then Moses and the Children of Israel sang" and the tense of "sing/ sang" (future or past) in his commentary. Rabbi Alan encouraged that every one of us consider how the words in that piece of the song were appropriate for that moment when the last boat left Egypt as well as now and for every future generation to rejoice freedoms, justice and opportunity.

- Art Siegel as Treasurer circulated financial reports that the Board reviewed. It is expected that the Temple will complete the fiscal year in the black.
- The Board voted to approve bema furniture with the contract in place with Amy Reichert Architecture & Design.
- The Board voted to approve expenditures to purchase white boards and their installation in numerous classrooms for the Religious School. This follows on the excellent previous presentation to the Board from teacher Ranon Herman and the current B'Nai Mitzvah class and their request to enhance technology in classrooms. A focused select committee will meet and gather needed information for specifics relevant for purchasing and installing improved instructional equipment in the classrooms.
- Former Temple Sinai President, Jacob Sosnoff, had his birthday on the date of the Board's meeting—January 10. Although he was unable to be present, the Board celebrated his birthday and noted the fabulous service, great fellowship, and many contributions that Dr. Sosnoff and his lovely family shared with the Temple over many years.

## GREEN TEAM TIP

### **COMMUNITY SOLAR KICKS IN!**

If you signed up for Community Solar you may already be seeing a reduction in your power bill. Have you looked into this?

Here's an example based on participating with Nexamp: when signing up through Nexamp, the new account is linked to the household's Ameren Illinois account. Each bill from Ameren includes in the Usage Summary, a credit called "Off-Site Gen kWh" that is the amount generated by Nexamp solar. The number of kWh included in the Electric Supply charges reflects this reduced amount charged to you.



When the Nexamp bill arrives, it shows the amount their solar generation provided for your usage and you receive a 20% discount. One congregant's household got credit for several hundred kWh each month last fall, and with the 20% discount, is saving \$6 to \$7 per month. Of course, each household's credit will vary with how much electricity they use.

The nonprofit Illinois Citizen's Utility Board website has an overview of Community Solar, along with a chart that lists the active projects in Illinois.

Note that while there are several state-wide projects, you must sign up for one of the projects that is specific to your residential territory. Because there are so many other charges (for electric delivery, gas supply and delivery, and taxes and fees) you may feel this is not a huge savings compared to the total bill.

But the savings are real and ongoing and you don't have to take any additional steps once you sign up. Most of all, you will be directly supporting the growth of solar energy in our community!

There's still work to be done, however – mostly on the bimah. Cabinets will be installed, flooring must be finished, and of course the ark and bimah furniture are all still under construction. Some of the electronics are also not fully installed, like the spotlights and cameras.

During the month of February, efforts will focus on closing out the work and also on preparing for final inspections, both from the City and from the architects.

It's exciting to be back in our beloved sanctuary again with new seating, bright lights, new sound system and gorgeous Jerusalem stone east wall. We now look forward to completing the final phases over the next few months!

The Return to the Temple Committee is hard at work arranging a Grand Opening with dignitaries, food, speeches and acknowledgements. We are still waiting on the timing of the bimah completion to have a specific date. Stay tuned!


