From Rabbí Alan Cook's Desk



May has always struck me as a month of potential. Perhaps it's due to the other meaning of the word, which Webster's defines as "used to indicate probability or possibility." The festival of Shavuot, celebrating the

revelation of Torah, often occurs in late May (this year it begins on the evening of Thursday, May 25; watch for information about a *Tikkun Leil Shavuot*—an online study session in honor of the holiday, and ETM services for the festival which will include *Yizkor* memorial prayers. As we celebrate Shavuot, we are reminded of our covenantal relationship with God, and that we have the potential to engage in acts of *tikkun olam*, making the world a better place for all who dwell here.

One of my favorite songs is a ballad by the folksinger Susan Werner, called "May I Suggest." I first heard it about twelve years ago covered by the Jewish musician Dan Nichols, and the lyrics so moved me that I asked Dan to perform it at Gabe's Bar Mitzvah concert as a blessing to him. I share some of the lyrics here in the hope that you might draw similar insight and inspiration from them:

May I suggest,

May I suggest to you,

May I suggest this is the best part of your life.

May I suggest,

This time is blessed for you,

This time is blessed and shining almost blinding bright.

Just turn your head

And you'll begin to see

The thousand reasons that were just beyond your sight—

The reasons why,

Why I suggest to you,

Why I suggest this is the best part of your life.

Each of Werner's verses continues to underscore the singer's conviction that this is the best time of our lives. I won't cite the entirety of the song here, but I think the third verse has a particularly poignant, and very Jewish, message.

There is a hope

That's been expressed in you.

It's the hope of seven generations, maybe more.

And this is the faith

That they invest in you:

It's that you'll do one better than was done before.

And inside you know,

Inside you understand,

Inside you know what's yours to finally set right.

And I suggest,

Yes I suggest to you,

Yes I suggest this is the best part of your life.

When we go through the daily stressors that we each confront, and the hustle and bustle of our lives, it can be difficult to take a step back and maintain a positive outlook. It can be challenging to see the promise that may be waiting on the horizon, and to envision the role we can play in making the world better. At this particular moment in history, many of us may feel it is challenging to see certain things happening on the national and international stage that are upsetting and run counter to our beliefs and values. But as we navigate any pain or unease we may feel, we are called to recognize that we were placed here for our brief moment on this planet to "do one better than was done before," to work in partnership with God to make this world the best it can be

This can indeed be one of the best times of our lives when we recognize what a gift we have been given to be able to take the teachings of Torah and tradition and to incorporate them into our lives, so that we may be inspired to leave a positive and indelible imprint on this world.

View Pollinators and Native Plants in the Home Landscape 2:00pm – 4:00pm, Sunday, May 7, 2023 Rain Date: Sunday, May 14, 2023

You are invited to take a journey through six neighborhood locations that are landscaped with native plants and pollinators along with more familiar garden plants.

There is no cost to participate. Visit as many as you like, each at your own leisure. There's no set route or timetable – anytime between 2pm and 4pm.


Five locations are homes where you're welcome to view plants in the front and back yards. The sixth location, at Sherwin Dr. and Race St. in Urbana, is a subdivision entry area where homeowners removed invasive honeysuckle amd are working to establish native trees and shrubs.

Sinai Temple volunteers will greet you at each location, and East Central Illinois Master Naturalists and Master Gardeners will be on hand to provide information about the plants. When they are not engaged in stewardship or caring for gardens, talking about plants is their idea of fun!

We are not publicizing the Yard Visit afternoon beyond Sinai Temple and CUJF announcements. While you're welcome to bring along a friend or neighbor, we are not extending the invitation broadly to the public so that we can enjoy the visit along with C-U Jewish community members. Please note, the homes will NOT be open for restroom use.


